County enlists in Connect Iowa's Connected program to bridge technology gap, boost economy, and pave way for improved quality of life

Howard County, IA – On Saturday, Howard County community leaders held a kickoff meeting to join Connect lowa's <u>Connected Community Engagement Program</u> that seeks to boost the local economy and quality of life for residents through increased access, adoption, and use of broadband.

More than 30 community leaders attended the launch meeting on Saturday. The team has been dubbed "Task Force Howard County" and is a collaborative effort between Howard County Business & Tourism and the Howard-Winneshiek Community School District. Staff from Connect Iowa, the statewide nonprofit promoting broadband expansion, led participants through the steps of the program. The Connected program offers a comprehensive and localized way for communities to assess broadband use and increase technology in schools, libraries, homes, and businesses.

Keri Schatz, in charge of public relations for Howard-Winneshiek Community School District, is excited to see the opportunities for technological progress that the Connected process will bring.

She said: "It is no secret that Howard County is the most underserved county in the Northeast lowa region regarding high-speed broadband, and I think many leaders in the community agree that by increasing our Internet infrastructure we can do a better job of meeting the needs of everyone – from school-age children who are increasingly using technology in and out of the classroom to learn and collaborate with students and teachers all over the world; to individuals who telecommute to work; and for those who want to grow business and industry, both locally and globally. Broadband just might be the key to an economic boost for Howard County, by putting us in a better position to compete and collaborate with the world."

In October 2013, Governor Branstad announced the Connected Community Engagement Program as part of the Connect Every Iowan initiative aimed at making Iowa the most connected state in the Midwest.

"This is a very enthusiastic and invested group of leaders. We are excited to see the county taking up broadband as a key economic development issue," said Amy Kuhlers, Connect Iowa program manager. "One of the benefits of this program is that we will take into account all perspectives and ensure that broadband is fully leveraged in all facets of society to attract jobs and retain talent, boost education opportunities, and promote innovative healthcare services."

Several local leaders are already involved in the project. The committee is part of lowa's plan to deliver broadband access to every part of the state. Ultimately, the goal of the Connected Community Engagement Program is to increase the number of high-tech companies and jobs in lowa, and ensure schools have access to the quality of broadband required to deliver the best educational resources available through the Internet.

The team will assess the current state of technology in the county, determine what improvements are needed, and devise a plan for achieving those goals.
